TERRY O'MALLEY: A SPOONPLUGGING TREASURE

The passing of Buck Perry has left a void in the Spoonplugging community. A void so wide and deep it will never again be filled by any one individual. There just is not another person like Buck. It used to be that if you had a question or concern about Spoonplugging you could write to him and be assured of a timely response. In the later years, even this activity had diminished. You could, however, still travel down to Hickory and the Father of Structure fishing would be there to greet and welcome you on a tour of Buck's Baits. He dispensed knowledge freely and was more than willing to answer questions in the hopes of guiding you to fishing success. But now he's gone. Thankfully, his writings, videos and tools are still available.

Though he is gone, Buck left us with another valuable asset; that being the individuals he worked with when he formulated and confirmed the basic tenets of Spoonplugging many years ago. Among them are people like Don Nichols, John Buoy, Tom Coleman, Don Dickson, Vic Saunders, and Terry O'Malley. These early pioneers have quite understandably become less active and their participation in the Spoonplugging community has dwindled. Terry O'Malley, however, has been the exception. His contributions to the National Spoonplugger have been a valuable part of the knowledge base that has proved helpful to both novice and veteran Spoonplugger alike. He continues to provide Spoonplugger training from his home in North Carolina and, as I recently found out, he's readily available to talk with on the phone should you have a question about Spoonplugging.


What makes Terry such a valuable asset is the close personal and working relationship he had with Buck. Terry worked for Buck, Terry was in the boat with Buck, Terry was guided by Buck, and Terry was acknowledged by Buck to be an outstanding fisherman. Many of the maps contained in the Green Book and Home Study Course were prepared by Terry and still serve as the model of what a Spoonplugger map should look like; shape location and detail, its all there.


His first hand experience makes Terry uniquely aware of how it was done, where it was done, when it was done, and why it was done. He is a primary source of Spoonplugging knowledge because he was there! He was there when the big catches were made. Yes, Terry was there. And he's still here dispensing knowledge and guidance in the tradition of Buck Perry.

Spoonplugging is hard. Spoonplugging requires discipline. Becoming an accomplished Spoonplugger is no easy task. This sometimes leads individuals to look for shortcuts in their fishing. These shortcuts take all forms: using a GPS instead of learning how to use markers and rifle sights, using the depth finder as a fish locator, using improper or inadequate equipment, and the most egregious short cut of all, ignoring Spoonplugging guidelines and procedures.

Terry will have none of this. He continues to offer advice and assistance by reminding us of the message Buck espoused many years ago: "You must go about your fishing in a precise and orderly manner." We don't have Buck around anymore to guide us and answer our questions but thankfully, we do have Terry. Thank you Terry for all that you've done for Spoonplugging, thank you for all that you continue to do for Spoonplugging, and thank you for all that you'll do for Spoonplugging in the future. Jim picked up this nice muskie from Minnesota on a trip that was a retirement gift.




Craig caught his first muskie ever with a little help from Phil





Then he went back on his own and caught this 45" with a little help on the net from Jenny!!!!!!!!!!!
