4. FISHING REPORTS - Scott Duff reports action from the walleye (pre-spawn), white bass and northern pike on the Fox Chain with water temperatures in the low to mid 40's and good (fairly dingy) water color for the season. The ice has been out since about March 20 on the northern lakes, a week earlier on the south end. The cooling lakes at LaSalle and Braidwood are now open, too. Heidecke Lake opens on April 1. LaSalle is open Wed-Sun but remains closed on Mon/Tue through April. Spoonplugger Mike Lynch reports getting into some good SM and LM at both Braidwood and LaSalle. The size on Braindwood is improving, too, as that fishery trys to make a come-back. Water temps in early spring at LaSalle typically range from the 50's on the cool side to the low 80's at the discharge.

As usual, we can expect our typically stormy spring weather to be all over the map. Its blizzards, tornadoes, and everything in between but get out when you can. Even though fish activity will be inconsistent, this is the time of year to get a handle on the new fishing season. The fish are quite active at times and can be shallower than you might expect. Its also the best time to take a look at new and/or old waters without any weeds being present. Shallow structures normally under the weeds, which the fish use during the early season, become apparent using the smaller spoonplugs on the troll (500-400-250). This can yield surprising results. This is the perfect time to map and fish new areas since the boat traffic will be less than during the warm season. Location will be related, for the most part, to the spawning areas. Expect to do plenty of casting in these areas, too. Again, the fish will often be found quite shallow, but if not go deeper (especially on the cast) along the migration route between the spawning area and the deep hole, channel, or slot. Activity periods can be short and unpredictable so stay in position fishing for as long as you can, if necessary. The seasonal perspective you gain from your efforts during the early season will help you do a better job, and will add to your satisfaction, throughout the entire season.
