1. MEETING SUMMARY - The February business meeting was held at the Elk Grove Village Public Library and was attended by 13 members. The club would like to welcome spoonplugger William (Bill) Wirtz of Rockdale, IL as our newest member of the club. Welcome, Bill!

The group continued preparations for the Winter Seminar to be held on Saturday, March 14. Phil Szafranski presented the latest on the seminar Interpretation segment as we viewed and discussed a series of slides showing discussion points and selected lakes. The club is very excited to hear that John Bales is again planning on giving an extended presentation at the seminar, this time on "Fishing the Deepest Water in the Area". Fran Meyers will be assisting with the PowerPoint slides for that segment. Scott Duff reported that space had been reserved at Russell's Barbecue in Rolling Meadows for the Friday night get-together and dinner. A few minutes were then spent tweaking the seminar schedule to accommodate each of the various segment. And finally, the printing will be ready for the March meeting so we can assemble the folders and preview the seminar program at that time. Remember, the doors to the Elk Grove Library open at 9:00 AM and we need lots of hands at the start to get everything set up.

Thanks to all who have been hard at work with preparations to make the Winter Seminar a success. We sincerely appreciate all the time and effort that they have been putting in.

- **2. PROGRAM:** Spoonplugging Tools-Jim Duplex led a discussion covering Part 2 his Spoonplugging Tools Presentation. We reviewed and discussed the equipment needed to do the job as described in Mr. Perry's study material.
- 1) RODS Two types are needed: Trolling (short/heavy) and Casting (medium-heavy)
- 2) REELS Baitcasting equipment is best all around, occasionally Spinning gear in the Spring;

- 3) LINE No-Bo for trolling, many members also cast with No-Bo; Running depths for Spoonplugs given by Mr. Perry are for 12 lb No-Bo (very strong!) 12 lb No-Bo is more than sufficient for most fish, 17 lb No-Bo for brushy/snaggy lakes
- 4) BOAT 14'-15' boat best, including the Trollers boats, jon boats, and V-hulls of similar length; A spoonplugging boat must have tiller steering for proper control!
- 5) MOTOR As per boat weight, 5-15 hp best with light boat, Four strokes up to 25 hp also work well;
- 6) MARKERS Carry plenty for depths of 15'-35', need at least 5-7 to mark off a wide bar with fingers;
- 7) ANCHOR Heavy enough to hold the boat;
- 8) NET Big enough for the fish you expect to catch;
- 9) LURES Four Types: Top-water or shallow-working, Weedless, Free-running/bottom bouncing (most important), Jump-type lures;
- 10) DEPTH METER Great aid;
- 11) CAMERA Document your catches, use as a mapping tool for recording line sights.

GPS can be a good aid in finding an area or fishing spot away from shore on a large body of water. It is also useful if you get lost. GPS <u>does not</u> do the job when it comes to mapping your structure situations. GPS does not give needed bottom detail. GPS does not interpret a structure situation. GPS does not give line sights to thoroughly map a structure by trolling. GPS cannot locate the anchoring position(s) where the best catches will be made. The correct interpretation and proper presentation of lures can only be accomplished by putting lures down there and checking it out.

- **3. NATIONAL NEWS** This is a reminder that the update to the National Spoonplugger web site (www.nsoa.info) has been completed, including a new On-Line Store which features an expanding catalogue of Buck's videos (on digital) and back-issues of the newsletters. Great resource.
- **4. FISHING REPORTS -** The cooling lakes have begun to reopen which is a sure sign of spring. Powerton Lake and Braidwood Lake have already opened (Feb. 15 & March 1) and LaSalle Lake opens on March 15 (but still closed Monday and Tuesday in March). The Heidecke Lake opener is April 1.

For those that enjoy the hard water, ice fishing is winding down and soon the ice will be gone from our natural lakes. The northern pike will be in the back of shallow bays and up on the bars around the inside and outside weedlines shortly after the ice goes out, and the muskies will soon follow. These areas will often need to be checked by casting but don't rule out trolling or the faster retrieve speeds when these fish are shallow. Same for the bass when they get moving. As the water moves up through the 40's F river sauger/walleye will be on the move as they leave their wintering holes and head upstream for the spawn. Rivers warm up first, and have a more uniform temperature top to bottom due to the current, but water levels and color can fluctuate greatly especially in the spring. Shallower lakes, lakes with dark water, north bays and coves, and the headwaters of reservoirs (migratory species) should get a lot of attention.

Keep the club up to date by sending in your fishing reports and pictures throughout the season. Remember that fishless trips can be just as informative as those when we load the boat. Early spring is also a great time to visit new waters and start the mapping process. You may be the only boat on the lake. Good luck for another successful and safe year on the water!

From Indiana/Michigan

Take I-294 (Tri-State Toll road) north to the Eisenhower Expressway. Take the I-290 (Eisenhower Expressway) west to Exit, Biesterfield. Turn right on Biesterfield and continue east about 1 mile to Wellington. Turn right and the library is on the left: 1001 Wellington Ave.

From the East and South

Take the I-290 (Eisenhower Expressway) west to Exit, Biesterfield. Turn right on Biesterfield and continue east about 1 mile to Wellington. Turn right and the library is on the left: 1001 Wellington Ave.

From Wisconsin

Take the I-90 (Northwest Tollway) southeast to I-290 and go south to the Biesterfield exit. Go east on Biesterfield about 1 mile to Wellington. Turn right and the library is on the left: 1001 Wellington Ave. You can also exit the I-90 at Arlington Heights Rd. and go south to Biesterfield.
