## PROGRAM

Grant Hendrickson gave the program on "Spring Fishing Lure Presentation". Grant is a long-time participant with his son in fishing tournaments, and catches many fish. He is familiar with Spoonplugging concepts and his programs have reflected that, especially in terms of depth and speed. For spring he uses a lower gear ratio reel to have better speed control at slower speeds. He mentioned several types of presentations that can be used in the early spring, especially with lighter lures and slower speeds. He has found big catfish balled up in 40 feet of water in Muskegon Lake and that bass start to become active at around 50 degrees. Those who didn't attend missed a very informative program.
